2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

- IQAC recommended for introduction of Undergraduate Programmes through Campus Mode specially, in the Science Stream under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS).
- IQAC recommended routing the CAS of faculty members through IQAC as per the norms prescribed by UGC/NAAC which was immediately implemented. Initiated the process of Assessment and Accreditation by sending LOI to NAAC. A steering committee was constituted to prepare the Self-Study Report and other related activities. The IQAC suggested that the University may enter into MoUs for research collaborations with institutions (both national and international) and industry in specific areas.
- The IQAC after thorough deliberations approved the Self-Study-Report to be forwarded to NAAC. The IQAC recommended the Dean, School of CS & IT to apply for AICTE approval for B. Tech (Computer Science) Course.
- The IQAC also recommended that the Department of Social Work of the University may develop a large network with the NGOs and governmental agencies and in and around Hyderabad to provide effective and rigorous field work training.
- The IQAC strongly recommended all the Schools of Studies to impart innovative teaching learning process to be learner-centric.
